GONE WITH THE WIND

Two Well Established Bowling Centers Close in Great Falls

This article is mostly a reprint of one he wrote that appeared in the Tribune the first week of September. This appropriate headline was chosen by editor, Tom Brendgord, a former Great Falls resident, who is totally familiar with the relationship between Great Falls and the wind.)

For the first time in more than 50 years, the Murphy family will not be operating any bowling centers in Great Falls. According to Dennis Murphy, Pin & Cue, the westside establishment that opened in 1963, has ceased operations and will no longer be open.

"We are closing down," said Murphy, who owns the lanes with his mother Elsie. "It wasn't an easy decision, and it is pretty heartbreaking right now."

The lanes were home to three major leagues, the Monday Night 535 Classified, the Wednesday Night Mixed and the Friday Night Mixed leagues. With the season coming up in the fall, bowlers in those leagues likely will try to find openings at the city's other four establishments, Little's Lanes, the Elks, Black Eagle Lanes and Aces High on Malmstrom Air Force Base.

"I have not heard where any of those leagues may go," Murphy said. He did not elaborate on why the lanes closed, other than to say finances were a part of it, along with other factors. "When my father (Jack) died, it crippled us," Murphy said. "We were hoping to sell the lanes to someone who would keep the bowling operation going."

Rumors surfaced earlier in the summer that the lanes had been sold and would be open in the fall under new management. "We've had some ongoing sales talk to keep it in operation as a bowling center," Murphy said. "But, nothing has come through. "We are also selling the liquor license," he added.

The bowling center closed its doors on June 3. Employees were let go at that time, with the understanding the lanes may reopen in the fall.

"It was a business decision which I think was very unfair by not letting the secretaries know at the end of last year that they where closing," said Floyd Bruner, who was a league secretary and bowled in a number of leagues at Pin & Cue. "I hope that all the bowlers will find a way to keep on bowling."

Earlier this year, Murph's Party Bowl, located on the East Side of Great Falls, ended its bowling operation at the completion of the league season. Skyway Bowl, another Murphy property, closed in the 1990s.

The latest closings leave Great Falls, which once had more than seven bowling centers, totaling more than 100 lanes, with just 48 lanes.

"This news was kind of expected," said Don Jordan, president of the Great Falls USBC. "This is going to kill us from getting any state tournaments in the future. "Right now, all that we

would qualify for are the seniors and the state mixed, if they still have that tourney."

The state association stipulates that a city must have two centers that total at least 30 lanes. In Great Falls, Little's Lanes has 16 lanes, the Elks has 12 lanes, Black Eagle has eight lanes and the base has a 12-lane house.

State tournaments are a boon to the local economy, with six to eight straight weekends of bowlers filling hotels and frequenting local restaurants.

STATE ASSOCIATION TOURNAMENT COMMITTEE TO MEET AT JAMBOREE

A full agenda is on tap when the Montana USBC tournament committee meets on Friday, September 25th in Helena during the Montana Bowling Jamboree. A lively discussion is expected regarding the state's lane requirements to host the open and women's state tournaments. The current requirement for a city to host such an event is two centers totaling 30 lanes or more.

In the past few years Capital City Bowl in Helena, Country Lanes in Bozeman, Skyline Bowl in Kalispell, and Pin & Cue Lanes & Murph's Party Bowl in Great Falls have all ceased business for one reason or another. The loss of those centers now renders Helena, Bozeman, Kalispell and Great Falls ineligible to host an open or women's state tournament according to the current eligibility standard.

The Montana USBC board of directors will meet the next day and will hear whatever recommendations the tournament committee has regarding this dilemma of declining eligibility among host cities. Since there is no delegate meeting scheduled for this Jamboree, in all likelihood there will be no final action taken until the spring delegate's meeting.

Montana Bowlers Place High at National Tournament By Curt Backa

The doubles team of Bruce Steffani, Great Falls and Helena's John Brodersen shook things up at the 2009 USBC Open Championships, held at the Cashman Center in Las Vegas. The duo fired a 1,444 to finish eighth in the regular division. In the classified team event, Montana Connection I, with Kyle Grossman, Mike Feller, Jim Watkins, Sean Engum and Les Comer turned in a ninth-place finish. The fivesome totaled 2,689. They are from Great Falls and Dillon.

Montana Women's Results at U.S. Women's Open

At the recent U.S. Open Women's Championships, held Aug. 3-9, at the Sunset Station Hotel and Casino, Montana was represented well by Great Falls' Doris Kimmerle and Billings' Julie Redfern. Also present was Shawna Lane, formerly of Great Falls, who now resides in Tucson, Arizona. Kimmerle averaged a respectable 193.13 over the 16 games of qualifying to finish 106th. Redfern finished 139th and averaged 183.75. Lane finished in 136th place. Of particular note, Kimmerle finished two places ahead of the highly regarded professional, Stefanie Nation.

I have mentioned on numerous occasions the BPAA International Family Tournament and how at one time it was the best kept secret in Montana. This is a doubles event in which parents bowl with their children, but there is much more to it than that. The prize (other than being able to do things as a family) is scholarship dollars and a lot of them.



On July 31 & August 1 this summer,

Montanans once again ventured to the international championships. This year it was held at the Main Event in Grapevine, Texas (a Dallas suburb). Our representatives were SheaLynn Hardacre-Stiles and her mother Kerry Hardacre in the parent/teen division and Matt Riesinger and his father Jay in the parent/youth division. Both teams are from Billings.

So how did they do? Admirably, to say the least. SheaLynn and Kerry finished in 12th place and earned a \$700 scholarship. There were 33 entries in her division. Matt & Jay finished in 16th place good for a \$600 scholarship. There were 34 entries.

For the last two years Montana entries have garnered 1st place finishes including Tana and Jake Lambert from Missoula and Heather and Keilei Kohlman from Billings last year and Melinda and Daniel Kagarise of Billings from the year before. But this year's representatives have no reason to hang their heads. When you finish in the upper half of the field in this format, you are usually only one or two bad breaks away from making the stepladder.

A year ago I mentioned two welcome improvements to our website, BowlMontana.com. We made the Tournament Tab easier to navigate, but unfortunately many people still don't realize how easy navigation on that tab can be. Just click on Go To Search Page and you can specify exactly what tournament you are seeking. We also added advertisement spots that will appear on every tab on the site. NEW LOOKS FOR 300, 800, 11 STRAIGHT STRIKES PART OF USBC RECOGNITION PROGRAM FOR 2009-10

Redesigned 300 and 800 rings and a new 11-strikes-in-a-row trophy are among the many changes being made to the United States Bowling Congress recognition program for the 2009-10 season that begins Aug. 1. The rings have been redesigned to take on a completely new and modern look. The design change has put the accomplishment front and center on the top of the ring while also showing off the season in which the feat was accomplished. A new 11-in-a-row USBC-branded resin trophy replaces the old plaque. This eye-catching piece can be displayed proudly with a personalized name plate that shows off the bowler's name, score and date bowled. "Our recognition program now rewards our members for their performances based on an average that now matches their accomplishment," said USBC Membership Development Director Steve Wunderlich. "We're confident that the program upholds the credibility of the USBC while enhancing the league and tournament experiences for the member."

There's also a completely redesigned awards application to show off the numerous upgrade possibilities that are available. Among the many new and affordable upgrade options is the ability to personalize a side panel of the rings for just \$20. However, upgrades are no longer limited to rings alone. Pendants and jackets now will be made available to bowlers wishing to commemorate their award scores in a new and unique fashion.

Another major change is replacing emblems for adult special achievements with unique magnets. In addition, the requirements to acquire these awards have changed to reflect the challenge. **Special achievement awards now will be given out for games and series only.** "We found that fewer people were utilizing the patches by sewing them on their bowling apparel and that more often than not they're discarded rather than displayed," said Bugsy Kelly of USBC's membership development group. "Our goal is for members to proudly display their achievements on their refrigerators at home or cubicles at work.

"Pins over average and series, all-spare games, Dutch 200, triplicate series, 7-10 and Big Four split conversions have been eliminated from the special achievement program. However, certificates and a purchasable award program will be available on bowl.com for members who wish to print out or purchase items to commemorate the eliminated accomplishments. The certificate program will be available online when the new bowl.com launches Aug. 3.
